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Media4 Productions' Mac Drive 98

IN MY WORK DESIGNING AND DEVELOPING WEB SITES, I sometimes deal with customers who use Apple Macintosh computers. Many times these customers will need to supply me with files for their web site, and often they will simply hand me a floppy or Zip disk that is formatted for Macintosh (why is it that Mac users assume that everybody has a Mac?). So I either ask the customer to copy the files to a PC-formatted disk, or find a Mac and copy the files myself. This has been time-consuming at best, so when I read about Media4 Productions' software for reading Mac files on a PC, MacDrive 98, I was anxious to see how well it worked. To be honest, because of the distinct differences between Windows and Mac operating systems, I was expecting to encour-

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Spell Catcher

DO YOU REMEMBER (fondly?) ShareSpell, a nifty DOS utility for checking spelling when using software that didn't come with its own useable spell checker? Well, this is a high tech (read Windows) application that does the same and more. So, if you need another spelling checker, read on!

WHAT IS IT?

Spell Catcher is a Windows application that runs in the background to spell check your typing. As it is application independent, it can work with almost any application in either an interactive or "batch" mode.

WHAT DOES THE PACKAGE INCLUDE?

An 86,000 word spelling dictionary, as well as user-customisable dictionaries. The main dictionary includes both US and British spellings of many words. A customisable "shorthand" glossary of terms, that you can define, for frequently used words which will be inserted when you type the 'key' letters you assigned to them. Automatic typographic quote and double space substitution A thesaurus including approximately 40,000 "entry point words" (that can be looked up), and 1.4 million referenced words.

Capitalization, punctuation and double word checking. A number of utilities including: case conversion, paragraph removal (for line wrapping 72 column documents!), space run removal (for all those extra spaces in captured HTML documents), document statistics including word counts, words/sentence, Gunning's Fog and Fleisch readability indices and a macro recorder to save complex adjustments to be reused later.

INSTALLATION AND CONFIGURATION

Installation is simple: it uses the standard Windows installation routines, all you have to do is tell it where to put it, I put it in its own directory in my "Utils" folder on a drive I use for programs only.

Configuration is where you get into the power of the program. There are some common features that you can use automatically, others that you will want to use only when necessary. All features are available by hitting the "Spell Catcher" button on the system tray. This brings up an options window, and one of the choices is "Settings".

You can select applications that Spell Catcher will work with and choose the dictionaries to be used. You can also define "hot keys" to bring up specific features, like the thesaurus, . You can use Spell Catcher either interactively or to check a complete document after it is typed. If using it interactively, then if you make a "missteak" a window will pop up with a number of suggested spellings, you select the right one, or edit the word, and hit the Replace button and continue typing. If in batch mode you can either check the whole document, or just selected parts of it.

If you routinely type some words incorrectly, you can add these words to the Shorthand Glossary, and Spell Catcher will do the replacement automatically. For example I often type "teh" or "taht" instead of "the" and "that". Spell Catcher fixes these errors for me.

As an example of the thesaurus, the word "application" gives:




It is a nicely organized site. They also have a message board where rumors and facts are tossed around with abandon. Before posting anything that you've heard on the board, search the site. It's probably there, and you will prevent unnecessary threads. However, if you just use this site (or a similar one that has researched the stories) to check the E-mail with a subject line that is just too scary or too good to be true, then you can avoid passing on a story that is totally without basis in fact.

Adobe Acrobat 4.0

DEAR BOB:

We have talked about this before, but because you are an avid Internet developer and a graphics professional, I thought you might be interested in knowing about the NEW release of a terrific software product—Adobe Acrobat 4.0.



As you know, Acrobat is a tool for universal document exchange. That means, that you can create a document in virtually any software product (word processor, spreadsheet, graphics, etc.); publish the document in Acrobat Portable Document Format (PDF); and either send the file electronically, post it to the Web, or save it on disk or CD; to be viewed by anyone with either a MS Windows PC, Apple Mac or Unix platform computer—complete with fonts and graphics. Acrobat PDF files are viewed and printed using the FREE Acrobat Reader, which can be distributed freely or downloaded from <http://www.adobe.com>.

Just THINK of the possibilities! No more cross-platform incompatibilities. No more missing graphics. No more sacrificing design for functionality. No more missing fonts!

Remember, Acrobat is not a new software product. In fact, many of us in the graphics world have been watching this promising technology, which has become the defacto document exchange standard, for a LONG time. In the last 6 months, however, you may have noticed that the graphics and printing trade magazines have ALL had cover stories about this latest release of Acrobat—and, all of them are singing it's praises.

What's new in Acrobat 4.0 that finally got the attention of graphics professionals world wide? Well...

- Many interface improvements that streamline working with PDF files, such as toolbars, status bars, and floating palettes for bookmarks, thumbnails, annotations, signatures, articles, and destinations. Also, they have added our beloved context sensitive (right-click) menus.
- Drag and drop conversion of many document types to PDF.
- Acrobat now installs macros in MS Office applications so that PDF files can be created directly from those programs. The *PDFWriter* macro creates PDF documents from Word95, PowerPoint95, and Excel97. In Word97 and PowerPoint97 you can use the *PDFMaker* macro to write PDF files that support structured bookmarks.
- You can now directly open files from many applications in Acrobat and it will automatically convert those files to PDF format using the configurable defaults.
- The new Batch Processing feature will save a ton of time converting files to PDF format.
- Acrobat will now directly download HTML pages from the Web and convert them at the same time to PDF. All the links remain active and they can be used to download additional pages.
- The Acrobat Distiller now has more options for converting documents. This gives you greater control of size and quality of the PDF file, enabling you to optimize the file for Web (screen), desktop printer or high-end service bureau output. These "job options" can be saved, reused, and copies made to accompany your PDF file if necessary.
- Job options can now include color management information; and ICC color profiles can be imbedded so that accurate color can be reproduced when the file is viewed or printed on hardware other than the system that it was created on. Also, in the Prepress options, you can choose to bypass any

color management system and preserve the original CMYK or gray values in a PDF document. (These color features are going to make MANY of our clients happy—and take the heat off of us, when colors don't turn out as expected!)

- New annotation and mark-up features streamline the review process by allowing clients and co-workers to make notes, changes or corrections directly on the PDF proof file. They can place "sticky notes" or pop-up annotations anywhere in the document, highlight or strike-through text, use graphic mark-up tools to "draw" on the file, and even electronically "rubber stamp" their approval!
- Best yet, Acrobat 4.0 allows you to do last minute touchup to client files supplied in PDF format to correct minor problems, like misspelled words.
- And... support for Asian fonts! (Now, THAT will come in handy, Robert-san.)

I have been aggressively recommending that ALL my clients submit their files to me in PDF format, rather than original file format, if they are choosing to do the typesetting and layout themselves but want me to produce final copy (laser or film) from which to make printing plates. It has solved a slew of output headaches for our small print shop—especially the problem of missing fonts.

Some graphics professionals are still complaining about Acrobat's poor support for some high-end pre-press functions, such as trapping, imposition and crop marks. But, give it time. I believe that Adobe will soon have those issues licked. Acrobat already supports PostScript Level 3 and suggests in-RIP workarounds to some of the problems.

With your active involvement in Website development and posting documents for Web retrieval, you are going to love not having to re-author existing documents in HTML in order to make them Web accessible.

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You will especially like the way that Acrobat will automatically search a document for Web references and convert them to live URL links. Also, you will appreciate how Acrobat automatically resamples, adjusts color depth, and automatically compresses graphics and text when optimizing PDF files for Web viewing and quick download times.

You will find you can't wait to use Acrobat to create interactive Web forms. You won't have to give up your custom JavaScript, text boxes, buttons, check boxes, combo boxes, list boxes, radio buttons or signature fields. With all the proper software and hardware, you will be able to collect data submitted from the Web via your PDF forms—just like regular HTML forms. The PDF forms, unlike regular HTML forms, will have the professional look of printed material with all the fonts, graphics and formatting intact and as intended.

I can't wait to tell my Uncle Jerry, who is an insurance agent, about using Acrobat Capture to scan pages from paper documents to create an Image Only PDF files for archival. If he needs to create a "searchable" (for retrieval purposes), but non-editable (for legal purposes) file, he can capture (OCR) the pages and convert the file to a double-layered PDF Original Image With Hidden Text. This will be a great solution to his paper management problems. He can put his filing cabinets in the storage shed and forget about them!

My friend Mary is going to be thrilled about being able to e-mail her clients fully formatted and non-editable spreadsheets for review. Most of them don't have the original accounting software programs that she works in, and we all know how long it takes to actually snail-mail anything these days. Critical financial figures could be obsolete by the time the mailman shows up.

I COULD go on and on... but I think that you have heard enough to peak your interest. If you want to know more about Adobe Acrobat 4.0 and how it can simplify your business communications and publishing tasks, you can check out the Adobe Website.

You won't have any trouble running this program on your PC. System requirements for Windows are only a i486 or better, Win95/98/NT (Serv. Pack 3), 16-32Mb of RAM, 75Mb disk space and a CD drive.

Acrobat 4.0 is available from retail stores, by catalog, and from many online sources. The price is well within your business budget—the street price is around \$230 (upgrade \$89)—a small price to pay for a product that solves SO MANY document exchange problems!

Clicking on one of these words will place it in the document for you.

ARE THERE ANY "GOTCHAS"?

Yes, a few. As it's a Windows application, it can't share data with DOS sessions running under Windows, so it can't be used with DOS mail-readers, unless you are using a Windows application to do your editing. Due to the way that the program works it sometimes picks unlikely spellings as suggestions. This is because it does not search through every word in the dictionaries looking for a match. Rather, it uses "Hash Indexing" which is a way of reducing the combinations

ter some difficulties, and I was secretly hoping that the program would work on at least *some* of my customers' files. So I was quite pleased to discover that MacDrive 98 worked seamlessly on my system. As soon as I had installed it, I popped in a Mac-only CD-ROM, and I was able to open every folder on the disk as easily as if it had been a PC disk. To be honest, I was surprised that MacDrive worked so well. In fact, looking at the CD-ROM drive in Windows Explorer, there seemed to be no difference between a Mac disk and a PC disk, except for the little red apple that MacDrive 98 displays on Mac-formatted disks.

MacDrive 98 is basically a program that lets PC users to read and write to Mac-formatted disks, allowing Mac and PC users to share files between systems. Files like web pages, images and text documents can be saved on one system and read on the other, so I can now easily take floppies with web files from my Mac-using customers and friends and read them on my PC. MacDrive 98 also allows PC users to save files on a Mac-formatted disk, so I can save a Word document on a Mac disk that can then be opened on a Mac that is running Microsoft Word. However, while MacDrive 98 will read, copy, or write any file, it was not intended to run Mac and PC programs, and though MacDrive 98 allows Windows users to share or copy any file to a Mac disk, it does not alter the data in any way. What this means is that any file can be shared, but to open a file belonging to a specific program, the program must be present on the system to understand (and read) the file. For example, I could easily open an HTML (web page) file or a .jpg image file from a Mac disk, because any browser, PC or Mac, can open those types of file. However, while I could see and even copy the AppleTalk files from a Mac disk, I could not open those files, because AppleTalk is not installed on my PC. Other examples of Mac files that can be copied but not opened are files with the extensions ".sea" and ".hqx". The Mac OS uses these files, but Windows does not, so while MacDrive 98 can copy them, Windows can't open them. And since Mac and PC programs are written specifically for their respective operating systems, MacDrive 98 is not intended to allow programs for one system to be run on the other (to do something like that, a Mac user would need a separate conversion program like *Virtual Windows*).

The advertisements for MacDrive 98 say things like "quick and convenient" and "It really is this simple", and I heartily agree. File sharing between Windows and Macs is practically effortless, and MacDrive 98 will access Mac-formatted floppies and other removable storage media, such as Zip, Jaz, and Syquest disks, in addition to CD-ROMs. Also, the just-released MacDrive 98 Version 3 supports the newer Extended Format (HFS Plus) disks. Options allow the user to set and customize MacDrive 98 behavior, and it can be easily disabled when the need arises. MacDrive 98 is a snap to install. It is installed from a single floppy disk, and the program has a very small footprint, less than 1/2 megabyte. Media4 offers a 30-Day "Love It or Return It" money-back guarantee, but I don't think that anyone will need to take advantage of it. I am very pleased with the performance of this program, and if you have any need to share files with a Mac user, MacDrive 98 is an excellent solution.

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it needs to check and thus speed up its search. This can occasionally give bad matches. Another potential problem, again as a function of the way the program works externally to an application, is that it sometimes deletes formatting changes in the document. This is most likely to occur if the format changes within a word or immediately after the word, but before the following space.

IS THIS A USEFUL PRODUCT?

If you are using applications that don't do interactive spell checking, don't have a builtin thesaurus or if you need the glossary or document clean up functions, then yes, I think that it is useful. Otherwise, you have to ask yourself, "is it better than the builtin spell checkers in you current applications?"

Spell Catcher Version 1.2 is produced by Cassidy & Greene, 22734 Portola Drive, Salinas, CA 93908 and is available for purchase through their web site or through normal retail channels.

The regular price for Spell Catcher for Windows is \$41.95US. Cassidy & Green currently has a "15 th Anniversary Special" price of \$19.95US for the download version or \$29.95US for the "hardcopy" version available from their web site only. The program is also available in a Mackintosh version.
