There was some esoteric talk about Outlook and Outlook Express, but since I don't use them, I wasn't quite able to follow the discussion.

Recently, a local user received an unsolicited e-mail message that contained a link to a website. The message was written in a manner that appealed directly to the user's interests, and he didn't think twice about following up on it. What happened next was a real-life example of what could happen to any user who access a site containing damaging elements. Here's what he said in his own words:

"I clicked on a link in an e-mail ... (that) looked legitimate so I thought I would take a look. ... When I got to the website, it was a rather normal looking. Had a black background and the word "ENTER" written in blue in the center

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how secure is your computer? By Harold Johnston

Like many Internet users, I have been online for some time and oblivious to the lack of security on the Internet. Then the story on a Netscape bug was published, and I was astonished that someone could read any file on my computer while I was online. As soon as Netscape released a fix, I down-loaded their new version. Then, feeling a bit safer, I put Internet security on the back burner and continued crawling around the net.

Then, a few months ago, I decided to get a DSL connection and network the kids' computer to mine so they could get online, too. I figured I better get a firewall or something, but didn't look too far into it because I hadn't actually tied their computer in yet.

The other day I was reading a magazine and it referred me to www.grc.com. I knew my computer was not very secure, but Gibson Research Corp.,'s web site really opened my eyes. When I clicked on their Shields Up banner, I was shown this: "Greetings Harold!" "Without your knowledge or explicit permission, the Windows networking technology which connects your computer to the Internet may be offering some or all of your computer's data to the entire world at this very moment! This is how I know your name."

GRC was able to read my Windows Registration file to get my name! Then I clicked on their Test My Shields icon and got even more information. "Shields UP! is checking YOUR computer's Internet connection security . . . currently located at IP:" Shields Up told me that my NetBIOS was open to anyone on the Internet able to determine my IP. And that once found, they could read, copy, delete, upload any file to my hard drive, upload a virus or another malicious program, and I wouldn't even know about it.

The next was a test of the various ports. The computer has some 65,535 ports that can be scanned and used. Here is what it said as it began the test: "Port Probe attempts to establish standard TCP/IP (Internet) connections on a handful of standard, well-known, and often vulnerable Internet service ports on YOUR computer. Since this is being done from our server, successful connections demonstrate which of your ports are "open" and actively soliciting connections from passing Internet port scanners."

Here again I was open to the world. Further reading lead me to a quick and easy solution. Because I am not sharing resources over the Internet, I needed to disable MS Client. Besides, it's not needed for an Internet connection to work.

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says: always use this program to open this file. Went back to the previous page that offered download of a free copy of Acrobat Reader. My version on my desktop computer is 4.0, but I didn't have Acrobat on my notebook, so I decided to download the more recent version to my notebook. It is over 5MB, and the download was at under 3K, so a half hour later I had Acrobat installed, went back to SLObytes website and presto was looking at the newsletter. The irony of this long story is that using Charter Pipeline I should have accomplished these protracted steps in moments.

I live in the country, have no satellite and no cable, and our phone lines are so wretched that the phone company has what amounts to a full-time crew at the junction box down on Corbett Canyon. Any day now they will replace the tin cans and the strings.

Ralph explained that Charter Pipeline, a division of Charter Communications. uses digital cable and will be offering satellite service. Speed is the main selling point of digital cable, but convenience factors abound. The fiber-Optic transmission to your 64K cable modem (rented for \$15/month from Charter) will take 2 minutes to transmit a MPEG compared to 16 minutes on your phone modem. The standard cable provides 6mb transmission, but enhancments are available. Your monthly service rate, in addition to the cost of rental or purchase of the cable modem, is \$35.

After installing AlarmZone, I hit GRC's site and the tests indicated that instead of my computer revealing the existance of my ports and that they are closed, it doesn't even respond and is basically invisible to Internet port scanners. Really Cool!

Steve Gibson's web site is a valuable resource for anyone who wants to tighten the security of their Windows PC. The whole time I was on this site, I was given more and more information. There is so much information there, you may spend hours reading and learning.

windows 98 update

As any Windows user knows, Microsoft is forever releasing downloads for Windows 98—bug fixes, patches, add-ons, and so on. There are so many that it can be impossible to keep track of what you do and don't have. Fortunately, there's Windows Update to help you make sense of it all. (Actually, you have no choice—Windows Update is the only way to download updates to Windows 98.) This "online extension of Windows 98" will check your system and let you know what you need to install.

Select Start, Windows Update, and complete the steps necessary to go online, if you aren't already. Alternatively, point your Web browser at

http://windowsupdate.microsoft.com

Click the Product Updates link, and after a few minutes, you'll see a list of all components not yet installed on your system. (To view installed items as well, click the Show Installed Updates button.)

Look through the list—particularly the Critical updates, which appear first. Select those you'd like to install, click the blue download arrow at the top or bottom of the screen, then click the Start Download button.

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of the screen. Naturally I clicked on ENTER. In 5 seconds or less, 40 or more MSIE explorer windows were opened. Before I could react a rather nasty Java alert messaged popped up. What it said I cannot repeat here, but suffice it to say it indicated that my hard drive was doomed."

The first actions the user took, to attempt to shut down MSIE by activating the Close Program dialog box (CTRL+ALT+DEL), were unsuccessful. Within that, there were many entries for MSIE which he could not terminate as fast as they were being generated. Eventually, his system froze with the blue screened "Invalid Page Fault". When he did reboot, it wouldn't come up even in Safe Mode. In DOS, he could see the Windows directory, but for some reason could not access it. Fearing that some portion of his OS (Win98) had been irreparably damaged, he did an unconditional format (FORMAT C: /U) and reinstall of it.

This user reports that he had his security setting on Medium, as many of us do, and also uses Guard Dog as well. In this case, I doubt that anything could have sorted out legitimate actions from those that were damaging. It's also hard to say if it was bad ActiveX or Java that did the damage. Further, he can't even report back to anyone what the URL for the site was as he lost all of that information in the reformat of his hard drive. (Clever foresight on the part of whoever designed the site!) In hindsight, he realizes he should have just turned his computer off as soon all of those browser windows started appearing. Without knowing just what damage was caused, it's hard to say if he could have done it fast enough to prevent it. It is clear the site was created only to create mischief! I did not write this article with the intent to spread fear or alarm. Such sites are, I'm sure not very common. It is presented solely in the hope of

preventing anyone else from falling prey to a similar attack. Please use caution when connecting to a website suggested by an unknown source!

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set to route the sound directly to the speakers. There is an easy way to fix the problem. Double-click on the speaker in the Taskbar. Once the window is open, check to see if the recording and microphone volume controls are there. If not, go to Options and open up Properties to check the microphone and recording monitors. Close that window and mute the recording and microphone volume controls. This should fix the problem. To make sure your computer is still recording from the mic, open up Sound Recorder and do a test record. If no sound was detected, go back to volume control and remove mute from the microphone and recording volume controls and bring the volume for them way down.

new to cdrw's by bob ward

Having owned a cdrw for more than a year now, here's a little advice that might save you a pile of unusable disks.

Pay particular attention to the directions when installing the CDRW. If it connects to your IDE port, you may need to make it "master" or "slave". The directions will tell you. Have plenty of free hard disk space. Defrag before using it the first time, then periodically if you burn CD's often. Why? Because a CDRW must have a continuous flow of data. This process can be corrupted if your hard disk is highly fragmented or there is not enough cache space to buffer the data between your CDR and CDRW.

If you purchase CDRW disks, realize they are unformatted. Formatting takes 60 to 90 minutes each and will give you about 560 MEG's free space. A formatted CDRW acts just like a hard disk. I archive files through DOS and copy them directly to the CDRW.

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cdrw's

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I've heard both sides of the coin when they talk about which CDR's to purchase. Silver for music, gold for data... Personally I haven't found a problem and disregard matching "colors" to media type.

My CDRW is an older HP brand, 4X read, 2X write. Although most of the CDRW's out there now write faster than 2X, I have found through practical experience that the slower you burn a CD the more chance you have at success. For this reason I burn most of my CD's at 1X, especially music CD's.

Note one big difference between making music CD's and data, or program CD's. I make all my music CD's at 1X but do not run my blank CDR's through the testing phase. The reason is if there is a slight anomaly in the CD, chances are you won't hear it on the music CD or it will only be a slight hiccup. I don't need perfection here, and most of my music CD's are converted MP3 files. If it is a data CD though, that glitch would most likely crash the installation of the program you copied to that CD. Therefore, I always test my blank CDR's when copying a data CD. It takes twice as long, but in most instances there can be NO ERRORS, or the copied data CD will not work properly when you use it.

I use CDRW's for archiving information like income tax records, club records, etc. Note, a CDRW can not be read by a regular CDR player on your computer. I create subdirectories on my CDRW's the same way I would on my hard disk. Therefore it becomes little more than a removable 500 MEG hard disk. Listen to these numbers folks! We talk about 500 MEG's like it was nothing. My first 20 MEG hard disk cost \$495! If anyone had told me 15 years ago that you could buy a platter for a buck that would hold 500 megabytes of information, I would have called them crazy! We have come so far in such a short period of time. Ain't technology wonderful!

Is that boot floppy going to do any good?

Needing to reinstall Windows? Better make sure you have a bootable floppy before you begin with CD-Rom support. What's that you ask? CD-Rom support? Windows 95 takes care of that, doesn't it? Sorry, Windows 95 does NOT put any there. You need to put it there manually. I believe all versions of Windows 98 create a proper boot disk, but I'd check mine out personally ahead of time! Just boot from the floppy, and make sure you can see all your hard drives and your cdrom (put a cd in and verify it) from the DOS prompt.

If you have drivers with your cd-rom, check the readme file and see if they tell you how to do this for their specific drive and drivers. If you know your specific brand and model of cd-rom, check out their home/support pages and look for help. If you are still nowhere, here are some generic helps which are better than none. First check out this site, it's pretty good instructions, and the info for the autoexec.bat and config.sys are good.

If these drivers don't work, or if you need more help, go to this site, and read his info, and maybe download his files. They contain several alternative cd-rom drivers including the mtmcdai.sys. https://www.bootdisk.com/bootdir.htm>

Here is another set of examples. Create these with notepad and save to your floppy, after system formatting it or using the Win9x backup disk utility.

On the second page, it tells you to system format the c: drive, don't bother doing that, as Win9x will take care of that. Just format it and each additional partition in turn. Then insert your boot disk and reinstall Windows! If you've never done this before, you are going to probably be nervous. Don't be! You are not going to permanently damage your hard disk by formatting or partitioning it. You may have to do it again, you may have to ask for help, but you won't kill it beyond repair. Just remember to back up your data, if you can, beforehand and go to it!

handy, hidden window 98 utilities

Just before the new year, when W2K concerns were still being hyped, I decided to make the switch from Win95 to Win98 (2 nd Edition). Windows 95 still did everything I needed, but I kept reading and hearing about new utilities that were built into the new operating system that looked like good troubleshooting aids. And being the nice guy that I am, I thought I'd share some of the ones I found. Note that each has a command that can be typed into the Start!Run box.

System Information

Command: msinfo32.exe You can get there the long way by going to Start/Programs/ Accessories/System Tools/System Information. What you get is information about the hardware and resources used, software components installed as part of Windows, and software currently loaded and running (called the Software Environment). To view any of these areas, click on a plus sign next to the heading shown in outline form. If you look under the Tools menu, you can launch other Win98 utilities, such as the System Configuration Utility, System File Checker, Registry Checker, and Dr. Watson. Want to know how long your system has been running since turned on? Look for the Uptime value in the right panel.

System Configuration Utility

Command: msconfig.exe
This is a handy utility used to modify many of the setting for Win98.
Individual lines can be turned on or off in your config.sys, autoexec.bat, system.ini, or win.ini files. You can use it to turn off the annoying Scandisk function if you are forced to shut off your system, and can turn off any program starting at boot up. The command msconfig.exe is found in the c:\Windows\system directory where

you can create an icon for it on your desktop. It's a very handy tool for troubleshooting startup problems.

System File Checker

Command: sfc.exe

The System File Checker verifies the integrity of your system files in Win98. Running this file will determine if any of your system files have been replaced or corrupted. It will then prompt you to replace them from your install CD. A nice feature of the utility is by running it after installing new applications, you can find out what system files that application has installed or changed.

Version Conflict Manager

Command: vcmui.exe

This utility enables you to revert to newer versions of certain files that are replaced when you install or reinstall Win98. An install of Win98 will overwrite DLLs and other files even if they were newer than those installed by Windows. This utility will let you restore those newer files. Launching the Version Conflict Manager will display a list of possibly troublesome files that you may then fix with the click of a button.

Dr. Watson

Command: drwatson.exe This tool can provide clues to software-related problems. Typing drwatson into the Run command box won't launch to a main screen or dialog box like the other utilities. Instead an icon will appear in your system tray. Right-clicking on it will display the user interface. To be effective in troubleshooting, Dr. Watson should be running in the background when you are testing problems. That way you can look at log files generated and maybe get some meaningful error messages about what occurred to your system. This may mean loading it at startup so it can try to interpret why a problem or a crash occurred.

Hardware Diagnostics Tool

Command: hwinfo.exe /ui
The Hardware Diagnostic Tool
provides the same information as the

Microsoft System Information Tool, except it is color coded to display problem areas and potential problems. Bright red displays problems and blue is for potential problems. Open the Run box in the start menu and type it in with the /ui switch. It will not run without the switch.

Automatic Skip Driver Agent

Command: asd.exe

When a software driver prevents the system from booting properly, this tool can help determine which driver is having problems, and how to fix it. Make sure two consecutive restarts were attempted whereby the same driver doesn't load. After typing in the command, a listing of all drivers not loaded should appear along with advice on what to do.

Link Check Wizard

Command: chklnks.exe
This wizard is found on the
Windows98 install CD in the directory
\Tools\Reskit\Desktop. It scans all of

is not found, it lists that file as a dead
link, giving you the option to remove it.
Copy Chklinks.exe to your Windows
directory and create an icon on your
desktop to use it.

IP Configuration Tool

Command: winipcfg.exe
This tool provides the current
information about your IP address
assigned when you connect to your
ISP. It includes your subnet mask and
the gateway your ISP is using. This
information can be helpful in connecting your system to other
computers on the Internet. IP Config
is found in your c:\Windows directory.



Eliminate Screen Flickers

Sometimes a flicker on your screen can be associated with the refresh rate set for your monitor. To adjust your monitor for an optimal refresh rate, go to the Control Panel and double-click on the Display icon. From the display window, click on the Settings tab. Click on the button labeled Advanced Properties. Then click on the Adapter tab to see the refresh rate. Set the refresh rate to Optimal and that should reduce the frequency of yourscreen's flickering.

Get Your Desktop to Refresh and Load Faster

When your desktop displays many icons in full color, it often takes longer to refresh and reload. To turn up the speed, click on the Display icon in the Control Panel. Click on the Effects tab and look for the box that says "Show icons using all possible colors." If you uncheck the box, you can often speed up the computer.

Diagnose System Problems

If you're getting a lot of system errors, sometimes the Windows program Dr. Watson can figure out what ails your computer. It will diagnose problems, intercept errors from your software, and prescribe a course of action. Keep in mind that Dr. Watson does not load by default. To run Dr. Watson, you must go to your Windows System folder and open the Dr. Watson (drwatson.exe) program. It's a good idea to have Dr. Watson load on start-up; to do this, drag the program or a shortcut to your Startup folder.

Tweak Your Graphic Settings to Prevent Freezes

When a system freezes frequently, the possible reasons for the problem are infinite. Often, it's a problem with the graphics card. A temporary fix is to disable hardware acceleration for the graphics. This slows down the computer, but it can save your sanity until you get it fixed. To disable the acceleration, right-click on My Computer and then click on Properties. Once the window opens, click on the Performance tab. Then click on the Graphics button to change the acceleration. You can set it to "None" for more severe problems. Restart your computer to see if this fixes the problem.
