At our September 4th meeting, our return speakers was **Steve Melancon** of **Premier Printer Repair**, of Santa Maria http://www.premiereprinterrepair.com/index.html Steve brought with him various HP printers and proceeded to demonstrate where the major faults lie, that we are all familiar with, in each of the printers, such as paper jams, printed pages having vertical stripes, etc. He showed us how to break down the printer and isolated the offending parts such as cleaning the pick-up roller surface, how to remove the toner, paper dust from Fusing Assembly in a laser printer and much, much more. Steve stated that both older and newer model laser printers have filters that must be cleaned for proper air circulation.

IMHO, there is very little that one can do in attempting to repair ones printer. It's best to turn it over to a printer repair shop such as

Digital Photography SIG Review by Kaye Raul and Peter Stonehewer

The digital photography SIG met on Tuesday, September 13 at the home of Don Jones in Pismo Beach. There were seven photographers in attendance.

Ray Miklas started us off with a demonstration of using Adobe Photoshop Elements to acquire images from his flash drive. Ray demonstrated tagging files and organizing images using Elements File Browser. Don then demonstrated selecting photos in the browser and then setting up a simple slide show with music.

We watched videos on using the PS Elements browser and organizer features along with a lively demo video from The Digital Photo Guy reminding us to always have at least two memory cards with us, use the card reader and have a photo recovery program ready when we need it. Safety issues regarding cameras, and memory card usage were also discussed and several good tips ensured.

In answer to a members questions, Don reviewed using Windows explorer to bring in and archive images from your memory card and then making duplicates to work with in PS Elements. The other questions involved using side by side views and when to use the native or the jpg formats.

Nancy Vrooman has offered to demonstrate IrfanView on the **October 11th meeting** hosted by Don Jones. We would also like to thank Mrs. Jones for providing refreshments for our enjoyment.
